The COVID pandemic has shone a light on the need for preparedness and the critical role that science and research plays in effectively responding to infectious disease outbreaks, and pandemics. However, innovative science alone is not sufficient. The connection with policy and practice is arguably where scientific research can have the greatest impact on people's lives. Dr Charlie Weller, Head of Prevention of Infectious Disease at Wellcome, will share her experiences in responding to outbreaks and pandemics, including the founding of CEPI and raising the profile of research to control cholera, and her journey from lab scientist, through industry to funder at the interface between research and policy.

Conventionally, artificial intelligence research and technology is thought to have had its Big Bang moment at Dartmouth College in 1956. Path-breaking research followed, confirming the relationship between reason, logic, intelligence, language and cognition in the grand European philosophical tradition. Yet, a different story could be told, grounded in developments of literature, arts, science and philosophy inspired by the mid-century independence movements in Asia and Africa.

In this seminar, <u>Pablo Mukherjee</u>, Professor of Anglophone World-Literature, draws on the science fiction work of Indian writer, film maker, musician and designer Satyajit Ray to propose a different account of artificial intelligence and our understanding of it.

Pronouns

You may have noticed that we are asking, when booking onto events, whether you would like to include your pronouns on your place cards. **But why are we doing this?**

Pronouns are words we use in everyday language to refer to ourselves or others. They can be an important way to express your gender identity. 'I', 'me', 'she/her', 'he/him' and 'they/them' are some examples of pronouns. Some trans and gender non-conforming people may use 'they', 'them' and 'theirs' as personal pronouns. 'They' is considered a gender-neutral pronoun, compared to pronouns like 'he/him' or 'she/her' which are generally perceived as gendered terms.

Pronouns can be used to role model trans allyship, allowing others to see that inclusion is a key component of our College culture.
